## The Seeds For Secure Food Systems Are Being Planted by Kitselas Citizens

Kitselas Employment and Training, Kitselas Five Tier LP., Kitselas Health Department, Kitselas Lands and Resources and Tea Creek Farms partner on community gardens and food systems development

For all of our community members and participants interested in learning about food systems and how to grow your own food — we have exciting news for you!

You are invited to take part in the planning and development of our community gardens, to have a small garden at your own home, and to join us for hands-on training both at the K5T clubhouse and Tea Creek Farms.

These are the initial steps of a long term vision that will see the Kitselas First Nations launch into social enterprise initiatives that focus on food security, health, and the wellbeing of our Nation and region through taking control of food systems into our own hands.

"Growing People, Growing Community, Growing Food" is the powerful slogan that describes Tea Creek Farm's approach to food systems that are Indigenous designed, led, and operated by Jacob Beaton and his family for Indigenous communities. For over a year, Tea Creek Farms has been working with Kitselas Employment and Training and Kitselas Five Tier LP to offer invaluable experience in food systems to Kitselas Five Tier participants and community members as well as growing and delivering fresh vegetables to our community.





Throughout COVID-19, Tea Creek Farms has supported communities in our area by ensuring access to fresh vegetables. Looking towards the future, we know that there is an incredible opportunity to grow and distribute food to our Nation, the region, and to work camps in the area.

There are potential partners who have expressed their interest in supporting Kitselas operated farms and food production.





Now, Kitselas Employment and Training, Kitselas Five Tier LP., and the Kitselas Health Department are all partnering to bring this hands-on experience and educational opportunity home, to our community.

This spring and summer we will be developing a garden at our clubhouse at 4404 Queensway Dr., Terrace. B.C. as well as working in partnership at the Gitaus community garden. In addition, anyone interested in having a garden box built at their own home is encouraged to email us for help.

The programming focuses on Indigenous-led food systems as well as commercial production and home gardens. Reach out to us today to take part in these wonderful initiatives —- we would love to see you at our community gardens, at Tea Creek Farms, or developing your own food box at home!

#### **Covid19 Support Payments**

You may have noticed two separate covid19 support payments in the last few weeks. The first payment is to cover the months of January and February. The second payment was to cover March, for fiscal year end.

## Answers to your questions on paying back the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB)



#### Why you would send the CERB back?

You must repay the CERB if you no longer meet the eligibility requirements for any 4-week period you received it. Your situation may have changed since you first applied, or you may have made an honest mistake when applying. This could happen if:

- You applied for the CERB but later realize you're not eligible.
- You applied for and got a CERB payment from both the CRA and El/Service Canada for the same eligibility period.
- You receive social assistance benefits and realize the CERB will affect your other benefits.
- You applied for the CERB twice in one period.
- You earned more employment or self-employment income than expected in the period(s) you
  applied for.

#### Still not sure if you need to repay the CERB?

Go to return or repay a payment (canada.ca/repay-cerb) or call 1-833-966-2099.



#### Before you repay the CERB

Make sure you know which department you got your CERB from.

- If you got the CERB from the CRA, you must repay it to the CRA.
- If you got the CERB from Service Canada (EI), you must repay it to Service Canada.

#### How to repay the CERB to the CRA

To repay the CERB to the CRA, choose one of the following options:

- Online: using CRA My Account
- Online banking: with your financial institution
- By mail: mail a cheque (new or the original if you have it) or money order to the CRA. Do not send cash through the mail.

If you are sending a new cheque or money order:

- Make payment out to "Receiver General for Canada"
- Indicate it is for "Repayment of CERB"
- Include your Social Insurance Number (SIN)

#### How to repay the CERB to Service Canada

To repay the CERB to Service Canada, choose one of the following options:

- Online banking: with your financial institution
- In person: at your financial institution
- By mail: mail a cheque or money order to Service Canada
   Do not send cash through the mail

If you are sending a new cheque or money order:

- Make your payment out to: "Receiver General for Canada."
- Write your SIN on the front of your cheque or money order.
- Indicate it is for "Repayment of CERB."

#### Impact on your taxes

The CERB is taxable and you will need to report any payments you received on your 2020 income tax return. This means you may need to pay taxes on the CERB you received since no tax was deducted when you received the CERB. Most individuals should have already received a T4A tax slip with the amount of CERB they received for the 2020 tax year. CERB payments, including any CERB payments not repaid before December 31, 2020, must be declared on a taxpayer's tax return.

If you received a T4A slip that does not accurately reflect the payments you received, contact the CRA by phone. For more information, visit **T4A**: Report COVID-19 amounts.

#### What you do as a member of our team:

Reporting to the Regional Learning Opportunities Coordinator, the Community Learning Opportunity Guide position is based out of our Kitselas online learning centre. The successful candidate will:

Actively support the Regional Learning Opportunities Coordinator (RLOC) to recruit and support students by responding to e-mail and telephone inquiries at the online learning centre, booking appointments for the RLOC and supporting the RLOC in other recruitment activities as needed.

Directly recruit students in the community following the standard recruitment process and build local community partnerships to act as referral sources as requested by the RLOC and within parameters set by the RLOC.

Prepare and maintain the online learning centre to support students using the centre.

Provide basic technical support to students or escalate complex issues to our Information Technology department. Enter and update complete and accurate data in the customer relationship management (CRM) system ensuring all required fields are populated on a daily and ongoing basis.

Each Friday afternoon, record data on Requests for Services responded to at the online learning centre.

Provide support and technical services to students studying from home.



#### Kitselas Renews Consultation Agreement with the Province

On March 9<sup>th</sup>, Chief and Council signed the 2021 Amending Agreement, renewing the Consultation Agreement between the Province and Kitselas for another three years. The Consultation Agreement outlines the process by which both Parties will work together to review and make decisions on proposed developments in Kitselas Territory that require provincial authorizations, and provides funding for Kitselas to that end. The process identifies the key pieces of information that Kitselas needs in order to assess a project, the timelines for engaging on different types of authorizations, and how the Parties will resolve any issues that may arise (see figure, below). Furthermore, the Agreement affirms the commitment between Kitselas and the Province to fostering excellent working relationships and serves as a tool for the Parties to explore approaches to reconciliation consistent with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).
